This will be more thoroughly reviewed at the end of the year once we have further data – including from external testing.	This approach has been shown to have raised attainment for all pupils but clearly more focus and monitoring needs to be placed on PP children. Teachers will be held more to account for their PP children and specific PP interventions will be implemented where there are concerns. The focus must be more on diminishing the difference rather than ensuring standards in the core areas rise.	£110,376

This will be more thoroughly reviewed at the end of the year once we have further data – including from external testing.	This approach has been shown to have raised attainment for all pupils but clearly more focus and monitoring needs to be placed on PP children. We need to ensure that PP are invited and, as much as possible, barriers that prevent attendance are removed.	£199.50

7. Additional detail

As part of the ongoing range of improvements being made at St. Margaret's since its academisation last April, it is recognised that there is much more targeted work that needs to happen to ensure we diminish the difference between PP and all pupils.
