## 6. SCHOOL ITEMS

6.1 Headteacher Report

6.1.1 SB detailed the schools statutory data as below

The school was in a very good position in KS2 with a combined ARE of 90% compared to the national average of 59%. SB noted she was very happy with the recent results. Pupils had made phenomenal progress and this was expected to be maintained . A new maths test had been introduced with over 20 pupils receiving 91%. The school would continue to focus on those who scored below this.

Question: Where does the borough average fit in relation to national averages? Answer: We don't have this year's borough figures as yet but 2019 had 66% combined. Traditionally Barking is lower however we have very high expectations and dont believe there should be any barriers to achieving them

# ACTION: Provide 2022 borough data

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6.1.2 It was noted that the data achieved was a testament to the shared vision across the school, effective teaching had been in place for the cohort for a number of years and this

was now happening from reception onwards. Pupils had had a disrupted few years with covid measure in place and the school was making sure to have positive activities to help pupils form social relationships with enrichment activities and PHSE being an important tool to achieve this now that education was getting back to normal

6.1.3 Governors noted that the report was very positive and that the school had achieved significant progress since joining the Trust

## Question; How do you go about improving on this?

Answer: The aim is to improve year on year and this is SLT 's focus. Results are just one measure of how we achieve this. We have areas we wish to improve on such as Science, history and ICT. It is important to be consistent across all subjects and we have strategies in place to achieve this.

## ACTION: Thank all staff for their hard work over the academic year

6.1.4 The young Transformer programme continued to be successful with pupils involved in many events such as enterprise day which raised £800 and World Vision day which was a cultural festival to enable pupils to learn about a specific focus. Pupils were learning about their own communities and had so far raised £3752.

6.1.5 Transition day had taken place the previous week, this day allowed pupils the chance to spend time in their new classrooms and meet their new teacher. This had gone very well and was nice to have it back in place after covid restrictions in recent years.

6.1.6 The new reception intake had been in to meet the eyfs team and contact had been made with nurseries and preschools to ensure a smooth handover in September. The SENDCO was in contact with any who had additional needs

These measures helped towards the accelerated outcomes for disadvantaged pupils.

### Question: How likely is it that you will receive more funding next year

Answer: The funding is based on each student and is set by the government. St Margaret's receives additional funding from supporting other schools and other schools within the Trust which is fed back in. There is a possibility of opening a private nursery on site which would also generate an income. Different funds can be applied for , for example CIF bids for building works, which frees up income to be used for the children's needs
